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Dear friend,

Last week, a brief but powerful storm blew the roof off of our sukkah, cracking a table and smashing the string lights. It felt a little too on the nose for a year when we hardly needed to sit in a hut to be reminded of our vulnerability. But when the storm had passed, I righted the listing walls and swept up the glass, and we enjoyed a few more meals in the (now extra ventilated) sukkah.

In this challenging moment, when time itself seems to have lost its mooring without the markers and routines that used to distinguish one day or week from the next, we need external structures more than ever. This week, we begin the cycle of the Torah again, retracing our steps from the chaos that preceded creation to the arrival on the shores of the promised land. It's both a fresh start and a revisiting of the past, with the hope that this year we learn better and do better.

It's a new year, but we bring our stories with us, telling and retelling them, illuminated by new perspectives. This month, we remember [Regina Jonas](#), the first woman ordained as a rabbi, who was murdered in Auschwitz in 1944 and whose yahrzeit JWA helps commemorate on Shabbat Bereishit, this coming Saturday. We also remember an innovator we lost more recently—artist [Elsa Dorfman](#), who passed away in May. And on the podcast, we speak with author [Gail Carson Levine](#), whose new young adult novel mines her own family roots in the Spanish Inquisition, telling the story through the eyes of a young girl.

Guided by history and our visions for the future, we forge ahead, making history as we go. We are delighted to introduce JWA's new [Twersky Education Fellow](#), who works to engage educators and learners of all ages in the richness of Jewish women's stories. There are many ways to learn from Jewish women, whether through JWA's virtual history courses, communal celebrations of Jewish women's civic power, or the power of storytelling. I hope you will join us.
